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Pastoral Letter

As I write this, we are in the season of Epiphany.

In church we have celebrated the visit of the wise men to the nativity scene

to view the new-born king – to wonder at the arrival of the messiah. Three imposing affluent men bearing expensive and exotic gifts, having travelled from afar by the guidance of a star. It is believed they came from Persia – the name itself speaks of wealth and culture.

It is a wonderful story of beauty, faith, trust and revelation.

We can imagine these earnest and determined men travelling through the towns and countries of the Middle East, many of which are described in various parts of the bible.

acting yeast to help the bread rise. Liz confessed she had obtained her 'starter' from a baker on the south side but who was no longer in business...which made us slightly worried..

Once we had our starter we then mixed in a variety of flours.. no.. not one of those.. And the type of flour determined whether you wanted white bread, rye bread, wholemeal or just makeitupasyougoalong bread which was a particularly popular choice.



On Saturday 11th January, Liz Macdonald led a Master Class in a Bread Making workshop as her contribution to the Talent Auction Fund Raising campaign.

Now usually of a Saturday night I would be out carousing in local hostelryes, or clubbing in the City, however on this particular Saturday night I found myself up to my elbows in flour..

Liz's breads are legendary, so here was a unique opportunity to learn the secrets of her bread making skills, so seven of us turned up on Saturday night to learn the trade and earn our dough.



We were to make sourdough bread which begins with a starter...no.....not one of those.....a sourdough starter is a mix of flour and water which produces a slow



Here is the Master Baker in action, showing us how you knead to need the dough, sorry need to knead the dough very thoroughly to stimulate the mixture and ensure that it rises properly.

We thought we might have to do a night shift but fortunately we were permitted to leave our mixtures in the church hall overnight to 'prove'.

On Sunday morning we all turned up at 9am before the Sunday service with a view to checking our dough had risen and was ready for the oven.

And so it proved.



We were given the option of baking our dough in a mixture of receptacles, ranging from Casserole dishes to Pizza stones and Le Creuset ovenware. I found myself with a chicken brick, and I



hear you ask 'What's a chicken brick?' and to be honest I don't know because it looks nothing like a chicken but it was heavy and had a fowl smell...

In any event, we could only fit a few of the loaves into the oven so some of the group had to take their dough home to bake, however everyone managed to successfully create a sourdough loaf and a measure of the success of the class is that not a crust nor crumb was left of



any of the produce so well done everyone and grateful thanks to Liz for imparting her expertise as well as making a valuable contribution to the fund raising campaign.

In fact Liz has raised a lot of dough doing this, just by using her loaf and I thought it only right to make special mention of this as it is the yeast I could do.

St. Andrew's Ethical Policy - Progress Report!

You will have noticed on the Vestry minutes summary page over the past year that we have been considering our practice in the areas of Care for the Environment/Animal Welfare and Social & Economic Justice.

Positive changes made so far:

All coffee, tea bags and sugar are now purchased from Gavin's Mill, to support a local business, which stocks fair trade



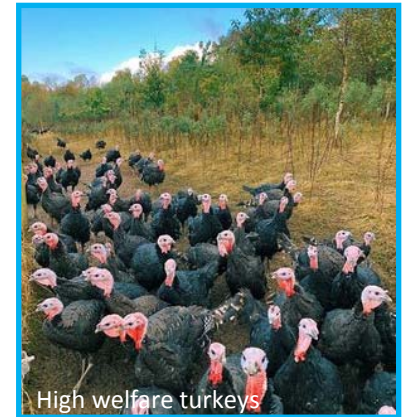
goods and supports directly development projects in the UK and overseas.

We pledge to avoid single-use plastic.



There is now a recycling bin for the hall kitchen.

Our Christmas meal turkey was free range, and the animal products used at the prayer breakfast now come from higher welfare systems.



Tea-makers have kindly agreed, where possible, to use organic milk, which guarantees the highest animal welfare standards.

We are investigating switching to an UK energy supplier which offers 100% renewable electricity.

Investments have proved to be the trickiest area! For example, arguments for and against disinvestment in fossil fuel companies are set out in a recent issue of the Church of Scotland magazine, Life & Work (<https://www.lifeandwork.org/features/features/view/390-the-disinvestment-debate>)

For the future, we are looking at investing as ethically as possible, considering risks and responsibilities, and sharing our ideas with our Diocesan treasurer whilst further awaiting the result of deliberations by the SEC Ethical

St. Andrew's Ethical Policy

Investment Advisory Group called for by Synod, and the next moves on the Church's UTP (Unit Trust Pool) portfolio, in which we are invested. So far we have sold a small Shell holding and reinvested in Lion Trust (specifically Lion Trust Partners LLP UK Ethical 2 Net Acc Nav!), and Gordon plans to invest a further £5-10K in Lion Trust or similar. Many thanks to members of the Vestry and congregation for being so open to making changes, and to all who have contributed their time and knowledge so far.

Have you any feedback, or thoughts about what else we might consider?

We are working our way through a small list, but any additional ideas are welcome!

You may be interested in www.ecocongregationscotland.org, a Christian environmental organisation addressing conservation, climate change and global warming, supported by the SEC, Church of Scotland, SCIAF, URC, Christian Aid and the Scottish Government. Its website includes ideas for action, resources for worship, and green theological perspectives.

The Cross was originally donated and sacred to the memory of Lieutenant Robert Wallace Lees of the 2nd Batt. KOSB who was killed in action on Sunday 3rd September 1916, and was gifted by his family. Robert's father was organist of St Andrew's from 1912 until 1921.

We are considering how best to display the cross within St Andrew's – various ideas from the existing stand (after refurbishing and cleaning), a new stand, or a wall bracket have been discussed amongst us and a decision will eventually be made!!!!

the year.

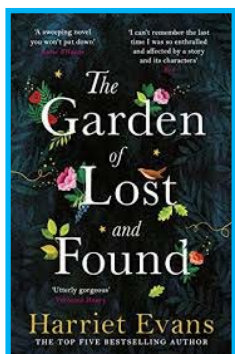
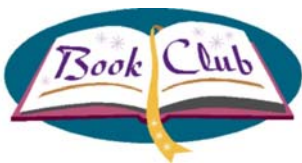

We shall continue to use the support of the Royal School of Church Music which supplied the basic form and theme for our Advent Service and the Reflections on the following weeks during Advent.

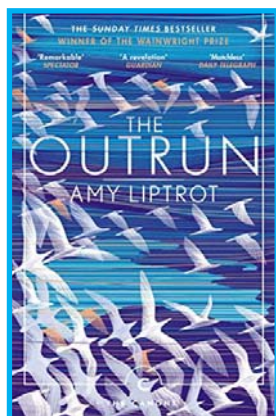

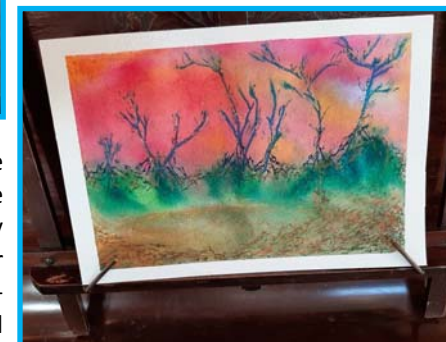

Bishop Elected



Our Lent Appeal for a Bishop has finally met with success as The Right Reverend Kevin Pearson was elected by the Episcopal Synod as the new Bishop of Glasgow and Galloway at a special service held at St Mary's Cathedral on 18th January.

Bishop Kevin is currently the Bishop of Argyll and The Isles and his election to Glasgow and Galloway represents a historic "translation" of a Bishop from one See to another. The See of Glasgow and Galloway became vacant in 2018 following the retirement of the Rt Rev Dr Gregor Duncan who had served the diocese as Bishop for eight years. Bishop Kevin will take up his new post at a service of installation later in the year, on a date to be announced in due course.

Bishop Kevin has served as Bishop of Argyll and The Isles since February 2011 and before that was Rector of St Michael

& All Saints Church in Edinburgh, Canon of St Mary's Cathedral, Edinburgh, Dean of the Diocese of Edinburgh and the Provincial Director of Ordinands (responsible for the discernment and selection process for candidates for ministry). He is also currently the Convener of the Council of the Scottish Episcopal Institute (responsible for the training of those entering authorised ministry) and serves on the provincial Standing Committee of the Scottish Episcopal Church.

Bishop Kevin was elected to Glasgow and Galloway by the Episcopal Synod, a body comprising the Diocesan Bishops of the Scottish Episcopal Church. In accordance with the Church's canonical process, the right of election had passed to the Episcopal Synod following previous processes of vocational discernment within the Diocese of Glasgow and Galloway.

Vestry



Summary notes from the Minutes of the Vestry Meeting held on Monday, 13 January 2020:

As seen below, we are making progress with our focus on ethical policy, with encouragement and guidance from Gail and Gordon.

Ethical Policy:

Green Energy – We have agreed to go forward with So Energy with has good customer reviews and their electricity is 100% renewable.

Organic/Free Range dairy/meat –The free-range turkey was a success at the Christmas lunch and there are now plans to provide high animal welfare products for the Prayer Breakfast that we are hosting on 1st February.

Recycling Bins – We now have a double -compartment bin for paper/cardboard & glass/plastic/cans. Positioning is not yet finalised but at the moment we are trying it in the kitchen.

Ethical Investment – Gordon has organised the selling of Shell Shares with £3800 reinvested with Lion Ethical Unit Trust. He suggested that we mirror what the Diocese has done with regards to wind farms/wave power, investing £5000-£10,000. The Vestry agreed and thanked Gordon for organising this.

Treasurer's Items – *Charitable Giving* – It was decided to donate £250 to each

of the following: ZANE (Zimbabwe A National Emergency), Barnabas Fund, an international Christian Charity supporting persecuted Christians who are suffering because of their faith, PAIH (Positive Action In Housing) which supports destitute refugees and Asylum Seekers, Bethany Christian Trust, aiming to meet the long term needs of homeless and vulnerable people. Creatovators a locally based social enterprise, which supports children on the autistic spectrum and their families, was also suggested although it is not a registered charity. Tim will find out more about it.

Quarterly Figures - Gordon talked us through the figures, which are encouraging, showing that we're in surplus with pledges increased by £500 and fund-raising ahead of last year by £1900 (last year there was no extra fund raising). Gordon was pleased that we are in a satisfactory position.

Blessing Boxes – Gail said that money is coming in but it was decided that a reminder by way of a mention in the pew notes would be helpful.

Church Website– Petko Marinov, the Diocesan Digital Missioner, is keen to visit St Andrew's & give any technical advice for those who manage the website. We are generally very happy with the website but Vestry members are going to look at it and see if any



improvements can be made regarding wording/photos etc. If anyone has any suggestions, please us know.

Talent Auction – Many successful events have already taken place & others will happen over the coming months. Liz's recent sourdough bread-making workshop was very much enjoyed and resulted in very tasty rustic loaves.

Advent, Christmas, Epiphany –Andrea thanked Gordon for his and the singers' input over this season and also Robert for creating the service booklets.

Music - Those who signed on the sheet will now be able to sing their favourite hymns, which will be included in the February/March services as shown in this magazine.



It was decided to hold a Songs of Praise service in the better weather, possibly on 26th April at 4.30 with tea and cake beforehand. The Piano – will be used for this event. It has already been enjoyed at the Milngavie Choir Memorial Concert and on other occasions when it has accompanied the choir during a service. The RSCM

material used during Advent, and Epiphany (& also the forthcoming Candlemas Service) has been much appreciated. Gordon suggested that we might have donations for RSCM at the Songs of Praise.

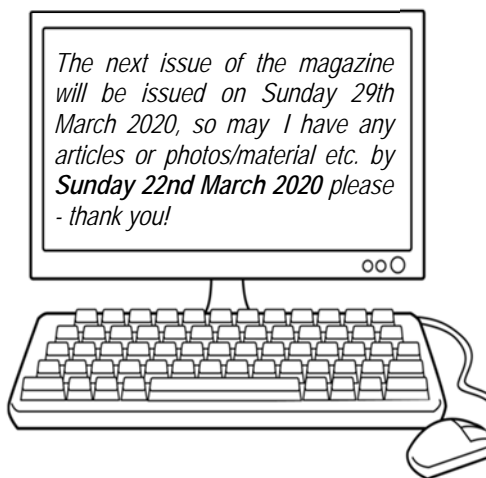
The Diocese requires that each charge have a Risk Management Policy, covering all areas of church life. We appreciated Tim's offer to look into this.
