It is a fine 1842 building on the main road through the village, and there are lovely photos on Google and info in Wikipedia. But a hearse house (shown below) in the graveyard hails from before 1770, when Bishop Forbes would preach there, monthly.

earth', and I had specially written an anthem on these words. We planned to process from the old building to the new one, but the Good Lord decided to intervene with heavy rain! The service in any case was a lovely contemplative occasion.

Andrew's (**Lieut Robert (Bobby)Wallace Lees**) who died in action on 3rd September 1916. It is in the form of a cross, which was gifted by his family, and which sits in the Rector's corner near the hymn board.
