Advent Study Group

There were three meetings to discuss the book, Advent in Narnia, written by American Episcopal priest, Heidi Haverkamp. Members of All Saints and St Andrew's enjoyed the sessions which featured the well-known book by C S Lewis, the Lion, the Witch and the Wardrobe. We were all familiar with the story, but were helped by David's encyclopaedic knowledge of Narnia. One week, we were treated to Turkish Delight, without being led astray by the White Witch.

I found that using the experiences of the children in Narnia gave a new insight into the Christmas narrative. The Advent theme of expectation was mirrored in the animals' hope for the end of winter and the return of Aslan, as exemplified by God's intervention into our fallen world with the birth of Christ. We explored issues of trust, temptation, reconciliation and forgiveness, which are all relevant to our lives today. I found myself wishing that we had more time to discuss these matters, and to try the beavers' meal, suggested in the book; fried trout followed by sticky marmalade roll!

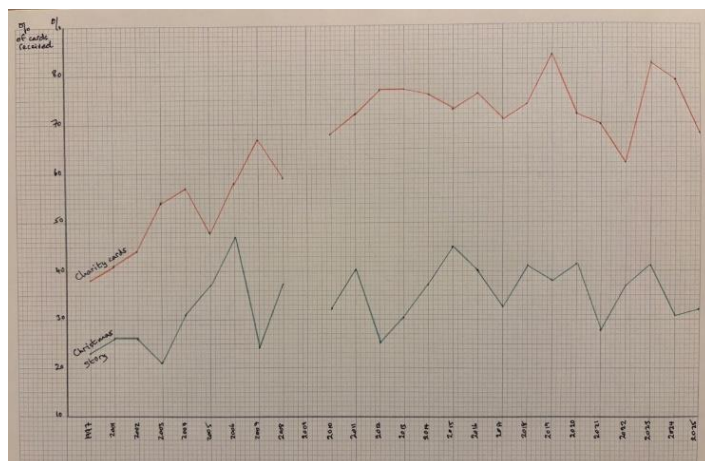
Christmas Card Themes

For the past 25 years (2001-2025) I have carried out an annual analysis of the Christmas cards we/I received. Figures for one year are missing. There is an initial outlier from 1997. This is necessarily a very individual series - cards received by others would have a very different profile.

My two main categories of interest have been:

- the percentage of cards which specifically picture or represent the biblical Christmas story.
- the percentage of cards which support charities.

The trends can be seen on the accompanying graphs.



Of the Christmas story cards, general nativity depictions were always the most numerous but for shepherds or magi alone, the magi consistently outnumbered shepherds.

Non-Christmas-story cards bore a wide variety of images. The popularity of themes varied from year to year. Snowy scenes always turned up. Some years snowdrops were popular, other years poinsettias. Robins often put in an appearance, but some years pheasants or owls seemed to be the "in" bird.

Glitter used to be popular. In my analysis, peak years were 2015 & 2016 when 18% of the cards I received had glitter. It was then noted to be environmentally unfriendly and its appearance tailed off. The last time I received a card with glitter was in 2021 and that was proclaimed to be biodegradable glitter.

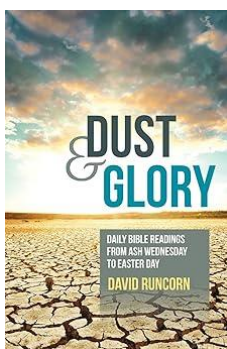
Sunday March 1st

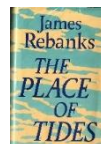
Music Hub Concert
